GRANTS AND SPONSORED RESEARCH

Katherine Dugan, PhD, assistant professor of religion, received a \$4,500 research grant from the American Academy of Religion for her research project “Catholic family planning and American Catholic identity.”

Charlene Elvers, EdD, director of the Center for Service and Leadership and the Center for Leadership and Civic Engagement, received an AmeriCorps VISTA grant for 2019-20 to support a full-time, one-year staff appointment. The person in the position will

work primarily with Springfield College undergraduate education majors participating in practicums at the William N. DeBerry Elementary School in Springfield, Mass. The program trains and supports these education majors to lead intervention programs in math and literacy for DeBerry students. Elvers received a second award of \$35,000 for FY19-20, which will support programming in Springfield area elementary schools.

Chris Hakala, PhD, director of the Center for Excellence in Teaching, Learning, and Scholarship, and **Mary Ann Coughlin**, DPE, associate vice president for academic affairs, received a grant of \$265,000 from the Davis Educational Foundation in October 2018 to work with faculty to implement a real-time assessment model into their courses. The grant will fund 20 faculty per year for three consecutive years. Each summer, a faculty institute will be held on the Springfield College campus to share results with neighboring colleges.

Brooke Hollowell, PhD, dean of the School of Health Sciences and Rehabilitation Studies, received a \$50,000 grant for the 2019 calendar year from Epstein Teicher Philanthropies to serve as principal investigator on a research, education, and advocacy project titled “Brain empowerment: Foci on aphasia, aging and diabetes.”
