PUBLICATIONS

Miguel L. Arce, MSW, professor of social work, and **Walter J. Mullin**, PhD, professor of social work, co-authored the following articles in *El Sol Latino* (Amherst, Mass.): “Presidential candidates in 2019: Their positions on poverty” (March 2019), “Creating PROMISE for children” (April 2019), “There is no room here?” (May 2019), “Too little food, too much month” (June 2019), “Investing in the future for the common good” (July 2019), “Springfield’s Gray House: Caring people can change the world” (August 2019), “A community development leader to celebrate during Hispanic Heritage Month” (September 2019), “The political candidates speak about poverty: What’s there and what’s missing?” (October 2019), “Understanding development and poverty alleviation” (November 2019), “It’s coming on Christmas and people are hungry” (December 2019), “How the legal system cripples people in poverty” (January 2020), “Who really benefits from food stamps” (February 2020), and “The census counts” (March 2020). After six years and writing more than 60 guest opinions in *El Sol Latino*, Arce and Mullin submitted their final editorial comment on poverty in April 2020, titled “The war on poverty continues: The series on poverty ends.”

Joseph J. Berger, PhD, professor of biology, authored the book *Science and Spirituality: An Introduction for students, secular people & the generally curious*, published by Onus Books in December 2019. Berger provides a short introduction to humanism that is aimed at students, young people, and those seeking to understand a world without God, as well as to those who believe in a science-based, naturalistic world view.

Julia Chevan, PhD, professor of physical therapy, co-authored “Developing core education principles for rehabilitation professionals in response to the opioid crisis: An example from physical therapy education” in *Disability and Rehabilitation* in November 2019. Her co-author was Amy Heath, assistant professor of physical therapy at Western Michigan University. The pair describe how educators in one state developed a set of core principles for the education of Doctor of Physical Therapy students in response to the opioid crisis. In the article, they present these principles as a model for educators globally.

Lara R. Curtis, PhD, adjunct faculty member in the Department of Literature, Writing, and Journalism, authored the book *Writing Resistance and the Question of Gender: Charlotte Delbo, Noor Inayat Khan, and Germaine Tillion*, published by Palgrave Macmillan in November 2019. This book presents the first comparative study of the works of Charlotte Delbo, Noor Inayat Khan, and Germaine Tillion in relation to their vigorous struggles against Nazi aggression during World War II and the Holocaust.

Katherine Dugan, PhD, assistant professor of religion, wrote the chapter “iPrayer: Catholic Prayer Apps and Twenty-first Century Catholic Subjectivities” in *The Anthropological Study of Religious and Religion-Themed Mobile Apps*, edited by Jacqueline Fewkes, Palgrave Macmillan (2019).

Sally M. Hage, PhD, associate professor of psychology, co-published “Investigating the role of doctoral training clinics in the academic preparation of counseling psychologists” in *Training and Education in Professional Psychology* in June 2019.

Chris Hakala, PhD, director of the Center for Excellence in Teaching, Learning, and Scholarship and professor of psychology, authored “The classroom as practice” for *The Exchange* in November 2019.

Brooke Hallowell, PhD, dean of the School of Health Sciences, authored the chapter “Strategically Promoting Access to Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology Services” in the book, *Professional issues in speech-language pathology and audiology*, 5th Edition, from Plural Publishing, Inc. In the chapter, Hallowell discusses the factors that impede access despite a dire and growing need for speech-language pathology and audiology services. She also discusses strategic means of enhancing access by optimizing reimbursement for clinical services, finding alternative ways to fund clinical services, pursuing legislative channels to enhance access, engaging in advocacy, using care extenders, taking advantage of technology, educating the public, and modifying service providing.

Stephanie R. Logan, EdD, associate professor of education and Department of Education chair, co-authored the chapter “Queering the curriculum: An exploratory study of teachers’ perceptions on integrating LGBTQ+-Inclusive curriculum” in the book *Incorporating LGBTQ+ Identities in K-12 Curriculum and Policy*. Her co-author was **Kyle S. Garron**, 2018 graduate of the Springfield College working teachers program, and teacher at Minnechaug Regional High School in Wilbraham, Mass.

Walter J. Mullin, PhD, professor of social work, presented two community trainings for DARE Family Services: “Mental health overview” (October 2019) and “Parenting foster children towards being secure and competent” (March 2020). DARE Family Services is a foster care agency based in West Springfield, Mass.

S-Cubed is a Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education-approved program for teachers who currently work in the Springfield Public School System and are looking to receive their post-baccalaureate initial teaching licensure.

Laurel R. Davis-Delano, PhD, professor of sociology, co-presented “A people of the past? Invisibility of contemporary Native Americans” at the Eastern Sociological Society Conference in Philadelphia, Penn., in February-March 2020. Her co-presenter was Virginia McLaurin, doctoral candidate in anthropology at the University of Massachusetts, and her co-author was Jennifer Folsom, faculty and doctoral candidate in journalism and media communication at Colorado State University.

Katherine Dugan, PhD, assistant professor of religion, presented “It’s about women’s health!: Catholic family planning meets secular science” at the American Catholic Historical Association Annual Meeting in New York, N.Y., in January 2020. Dugan also presented “Natural family planning, social media, and the ethnographic method online,” at the American Academy of Religion Annual Meeting in San Diego, Calif., in November 2019.

The presentation focused on the examination of curricular and cocurricular opportunities with a community partner. The session explained how one partnership with a nonprofit sport organization in Springfield, Mass., has been leveraged for multiple curricular, cocurricular, and research opportunities within the Department of Sport Management and Recreation at Springfield College.

Robert Gruber, PhD, assistant professor of philosophy, presented “Control, collective action, and a solution to the mismatch problem” at the Biennial Philosophy Homecoming Conference at the University of Massachusetts in Amherst, Mass., in October 2019. The talk attempted to offer solutions to a puzzle in the ethics of collective action: Every time a group has acted wrongly, is it possible to attribute wrongdoing to at least one of the individuals involved?

Hage, PhD, associate professor of psychology, was a panelist for a webinar on “Practitioners publishing in counseling psychology journals: The integration of practice, advocacy, and science,” sponsored by the Society of Counseling Psychology in October 2019. Her co-presenters were **Philip Imholte**, **Shawn Saylor**, **Julie Freedman**, and **Marcus Dumas**, all current doctoral students in the Doctor of Psychology in counseling psychology program. At the same conference, Hage co-presented “Sexual assault prevention: Addressing toxic masculinity in reducing violence” at the Innovative Approaches to Working with College Men to Prevent Sexual Assault Symposium. Her co-presenter was **Sean DeMartino**, PsyD, assistant professor of psychology.

Chris Hakala, PhD, director of the Center for Excellence in Teaching, Learning, and Scholarship and professor of psychology, presented “Team teaching: What the science of learning can tell us” at the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy Annual Meeting in Chicago in July 2019.

GRANTS AND SPONSORED RESEARCH

In December 2019, **Brooke Hallowell**, PhD, dean of the School of Health Sciences, was awarded a \$50,000 grant from Epstein Teicher Philanthropies to support a project titled “Brain empowerment: Foci on aphasia, aging and diabetes.”

Ian Delahanty, PhD, assistant professor of history, **Jeffrey L. Monseau**, Springfield College archivist, and **Linda Davis-Delano**, PhD, professor of physical education and director of educator preparation and licensure, received a \$10,000 research grant from the Council of Independent Colleges for their research project titled “When the Sixties Came to Springfield: Legacies of Activism and Protest for a College and its City” in March 2020. Delahanty will oversee a group of Springfield College students who will conduct research in the College archives into the student protests of 1969-70. Assisted by Monseau, the students will create a digital collection of archival materials related to the student protests and add to it oral history interviews with civil rights activists from the City of Springfield during the 1960s. Delahanty, Monseau, and the student researchers will collaborate with history teachers at Springfield Central High School to design archival source-based curricula and experiential learning opportunities centered on the Springfield College student protests of 1969-70, a partnership made possible by Davis-Delano.

AWARDS

Nina Esaki, PhD, assistant professor of social work, was awarded a fellowship of the Project for Ethical Leadership Excellence by the University of Louisville College of Business in November 2019. The fellowship is in support of a research study titled “Inspiring ethical leadership.” Esaki will use participatory action research to develop a practical ethical and effective leadership assessment tool for use in the human services field to inform impact investing, to identify areas for leadership improvement, and to maximize the well-being of staff and clients.

Brooke Hallowell, PhD, dean of the School of Health Sciences, was appointed chair of the newly established Committee to Develop Guidance for Members and Students Engaging Globally in Clinical, Scholarly, and Other Professional Activities by the board of directors of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA). The international committee is comprised of seven members, each representing a constituency of ASHA membership. In December 2019, the group began developing and recommending guidance regarding global delivery of clinical services, student clinical experiences, student supervision, volunteer work, and research.

Kari B. Taylor, PhD, assistant professor in the student affairs administration program, was elected in March 2020 to serve a three-year term on the directorate board for the American College Personnel Association Student Affairs Educators International Commission for Professional Preparation, which supports faculty of graduate programs in higher education and student affairs. Election to this board allows Taylor to enhance her own teaching while facilitating development among fellow faculty, which ultimately enhances student learning within the field.

ENDEAVORS

Julia Chevan, PhD, professor of physical therapy, recently appeared on The Healing Pain Podcast. In this episode, Chevan talked about her work in breaking ground for the education of physical therapists in the context of the opioid crisis in the United States.

President **Mary-Beth A. Cooper**, PhD, DM, and **Brooke Hallowell**, PhD, dean of the School of Health Sciences, spearheaded the Springfield College donation of 50,000 pair of gloves to the staff at Mercy Hospital in Springfield, Mass., in April 2020. Chairman of the Board for Mercy Hospital and Trinity Health of New England Paul Mancione called the donation “lifesaving measures.” “I did not know these people two weeks ago and I consider them friends today,” Mancione said during an interview on *MassAppeal* on WWLP TV 22.

Laurel R. Davis-Delano, PhD, professor of sociology, was an interviewee for two podcasts. The first, “The Native American mascot controversy,” aired Feb. 9, 2020. The second, “The Native American mascot controversy, Part 2,” aired on Feb. 16, 2020. Both podcasts were part of Captain Hunter’s Podcast, a society and culture podcast dedicated to bridging the gap between police and the communities they serve.

Linda Davis-Delano, PhD, professor of physical education and director of educator preparation and licensure, was inducted in the Lake County (Illinois) High School Sports Hall of Fame for coaching volleyball and softball at Libertyville High School between 1975 and 1987, where she also was a physical education teacher. During her 10 years as the head volleyball coach, her coaching record was 228-6. Her teams won nine conference championships, eight regional championships, and three sectional championships. Her 11-year softball coaching record was 163-60, during which her teams won four conference championships and two regional championships.

A feature story for *masslive.com*, written by **Martin Dobrow**, professor of communications, was listed among the best sports journalism in the country in the 2019 Best American Sports Writing anthology. The April 17, 2018, story—“Hoops, Hijabs, Heartbreak and Hope”—focused on basketball standout and social justice pioneer Bilqis Abdul-Qadir. This marks the sixth time that Dobrow’s work has been celebrated in this prestigious national anthology.

Justine Dymond, PhD, associate professor of English, was selected to participate as a storyteller in the New England Public Radio Valley Voices Slam under the theme “Sweet & Salty.” She wrote and performed a five-minute true story titled “Handiwork” without using notes. The event took place at Hawks & Reed Performing Arts Center in Greenfield, Mass., in front of an audience in March 2020.
