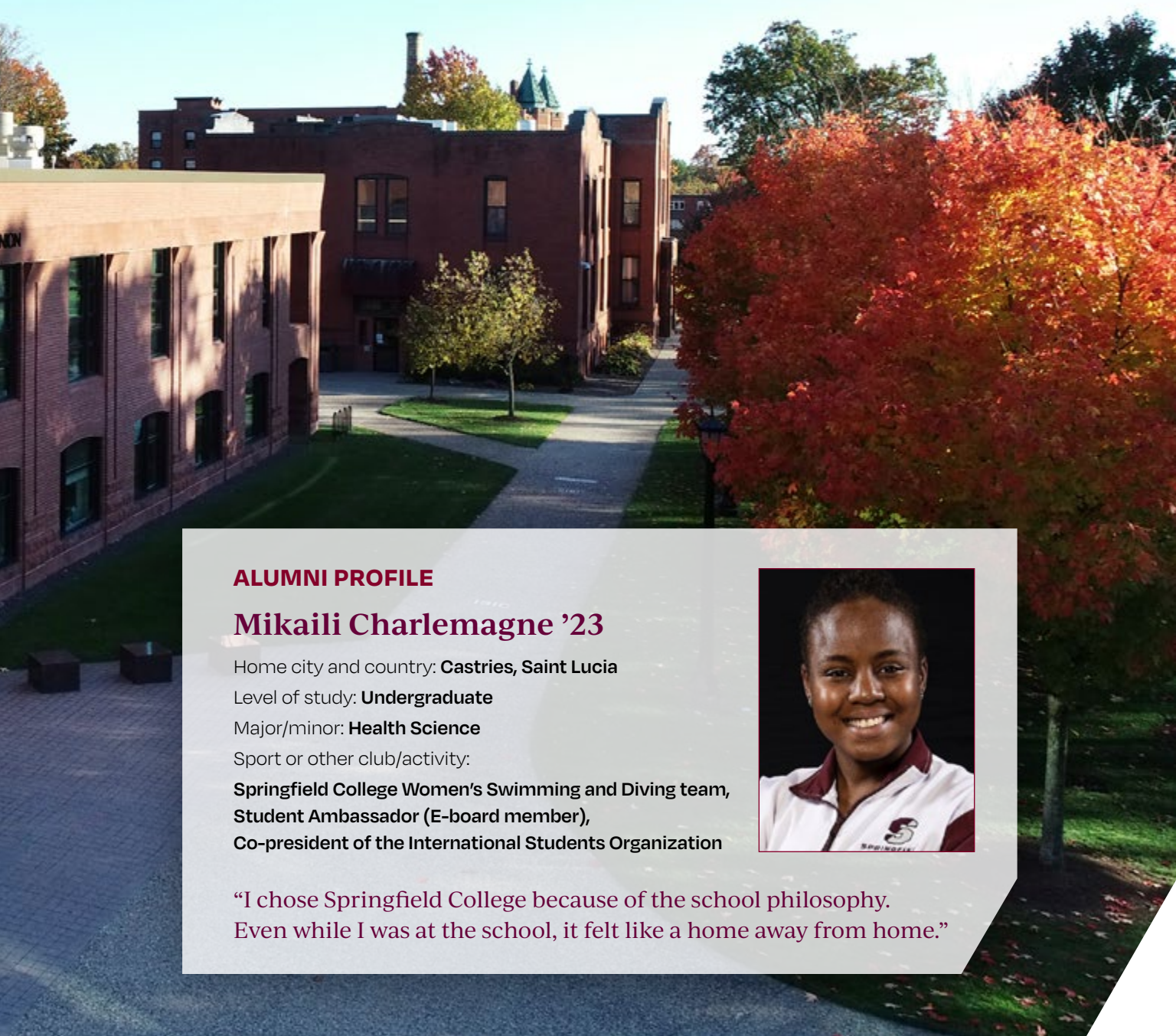

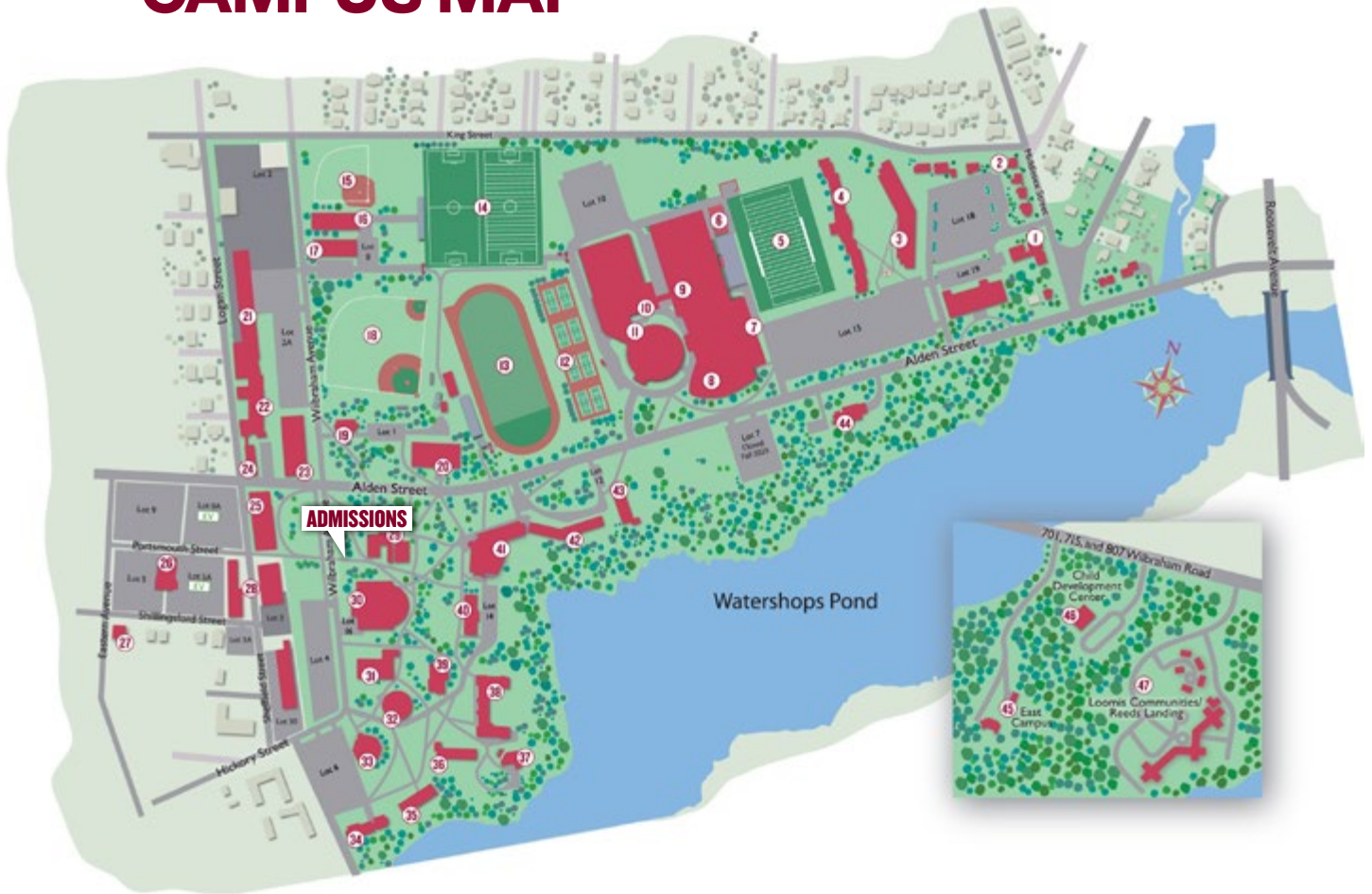

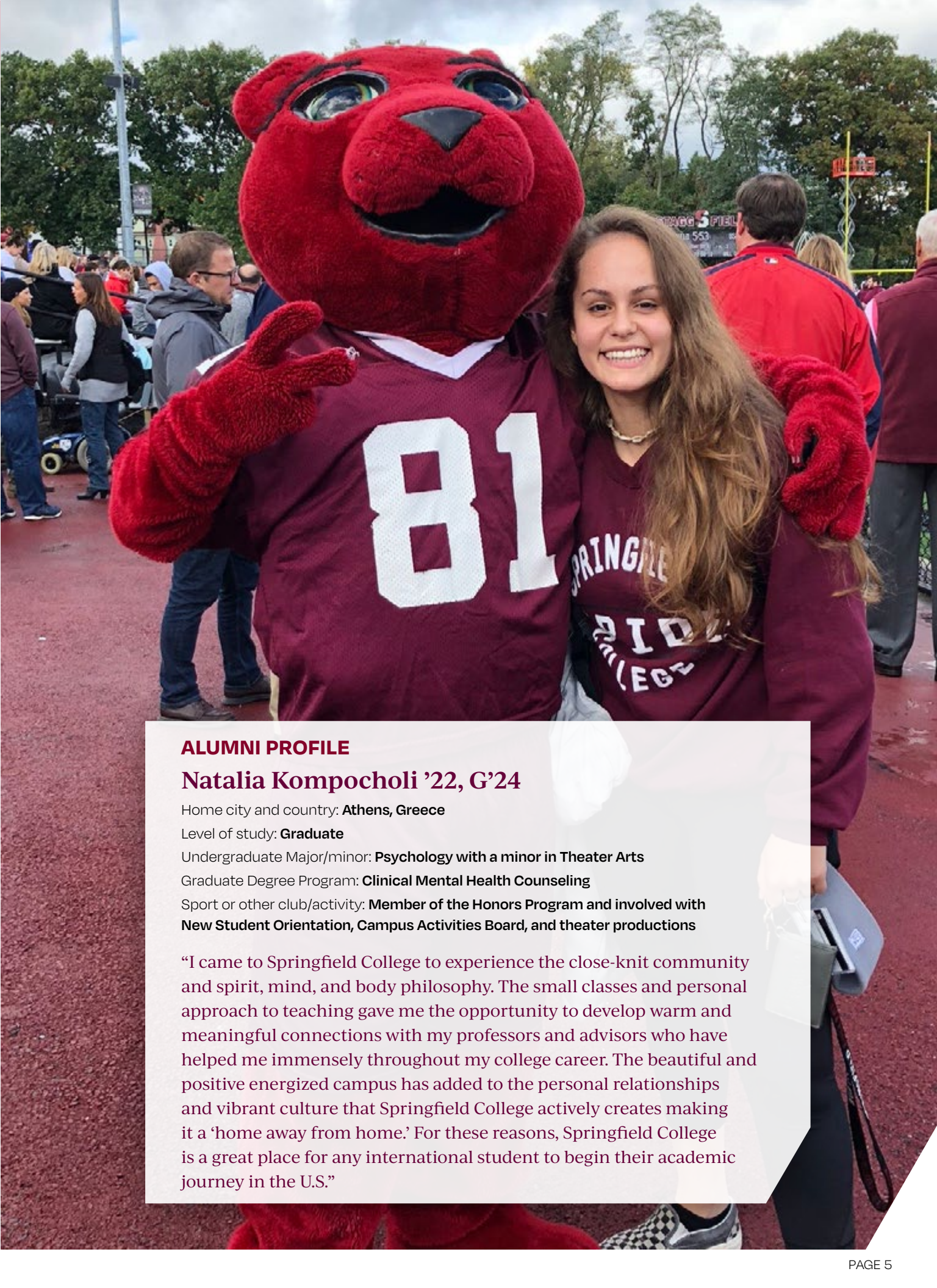

PRE-ARRIVAL CHECKLIST

Springfield Email Address and Intranet (all students)

- Your Springfield email address and initial password will be emailed to your address on record. Contact intladmissions@springfield.edu with questions.
- PrideNET is what we call the Springfield College internal portal. It's how you'll access your Springfield email, see your housing placement, view your course schedule, and keep track of financial matters so make sure you can **log in to your PrideNET account**.

Visas

(all students)

- Pay the SEVIS fee.
- Apply for your F-1 visa (students from Canada will receive this upon entering the United States).

Academic Requirements and Courses (undergraduate students)

- Complete the pre-advising questionnaire to select courses for your major. The questionnaire will be sent from Academic Advising to your Springfield email address.
- Complete the math assessment. The assessment will be sent from Academic Advising to your Springfield College email address.
- During a meeting with Academic Advising, you will confirm your semester schedule. Make sure to attend this meeting once it is scheduled.
- Send us your final secondary/high school transcript as soon as possible to intladmissions@springfield.edu.

- Transfer students:
Send us your final university transcript as soon as possible to intladmissions@springfield.edu.

Immunizations

(all students)

- Make sure to get your required immunizations.

Financial Matters

(all students)

- Pay your e-bill in PrideNET by going to your "My Financial" portal. Set up a payment plan or make a one-time payment. Review **Payment Options**.
- Complete Student Accounts action items: eSign the Financial Obligation Agreement and set up a parent as an "authorized user" in the Parent Portal.

Housing and Meal Plan

(all students)

- Review **Housing and Dining Options**.
- Complete your housing survey/contract.
- Graduate Students: Pay your housing deposit.
- If you are a graduate student and do not need on-campus housing, please notify us at internationalcenter@springfield.edu.
- A basic bedding pack will be provided to all undergraduate international students who complete the Arrival Form. Graduate students can request a bedding pack on the Arrival Form.
- Check out **what to bring** and how to rent a MicroFridge.

PRE-ARRIVAL CHECKLIST

U.S. Phone Number and SIM Card

- A U.S. SIM card will be provided in your international student welcome packet. You may also have the opportunity to purchase a U.S. SIM card or mobile phone during orientation or welcome week. You will need funds to activate your service.

Community Online Training Programs (all students)

- All members of the Springfield College community will receive an email invitation to complete the following required online training programs:
 - o Drugs and Alcohol
 - o Title IX: protects people from discrimination based on sex in education programs
 - o Managing Bias

Arrival Information (all students)

- Check required arrival dates for international student welcome (undergraduate) or for your degree program (graduate).

- Submit your arrival form online or inform the International Center staff of your arrival at internationalcenter@springfield.edu.

Important Travel Documents/Items (all students)

- Passport
- Valid student visa
- Valid I-20
- Acceptance letter from Springfield College
- A bank statement/letter to prove you have enough money to study in the U.S.
- U.S. plug adapter (plug type A and B) and voltage converter (120 V; 60 Hz), if necessary
- U.S. currency for your first few days (recommended)
- Credit card (recommended)



IMPORTANT TRAVEL INFORMATION



TRAVEL AND IMMIGRATION REQUIREMENTS

New undergraduate international students should make their travel arrangements based on arrival information provided by the International Center and in time to attend required orientation program(s). Graduate students should plan their travel according to the requirements of their degree program. When traveling to the United States, the following documents are required for entry:

- Passport
- Valid student Visa (Canadian citizens will receive a Visa upon entering the U.S.)
- I-20
- Your acceptance letter from Springfield College
- A bank statement/letter to prove you have enough money to study in the U.S.

AIRPORT PICK-UP

Transportation will be provided from Bradley International Airport-Hartford, Conn., or Union Station-Springfield, Mass., during

designated arrival dates only. All students should submit their travel plans via the arrival form that will be sent to you from the International Office staff.

IMMUNIZATIONS, HEALTH INSURANCE, AND HEALTH FORMS

- Immunizations are mandatory. Please get immunizations in your home country, if at all possible, to avoid out-of-pocket expenses and complications.
- Massachusetts law requires that all full-time and three-quarter-time students enroll in the Springfield College student health insurance plan.
- International students will be automatically enrolled in this plan and coverage will begin upon arrival.
- Before you arrive, all required **health forms** need to be submitted to healthcenter@springfield.edu.

PACKING LIST

- Massachusetts has four distinct seasons. For winter months, you will need warm, water/windproof clothes that you can wear in layers and winter boots. Dress on campus is casual. There may be some events where professional dress is required.
- Only pack what is necessary. Most items can be purchased after you arrive at Springfield.
- Make sure to bring a U.S. plug adapter for computers and electronic equipment as you will want to use those items right away and adapters are not sold on campus.

HOUSING AND MEAL PLANS

UNDERGRADUATE HOUSING PLACEMENT AND MEAL PLANS

- **Housing and Dining Information**
- New, first-year student residents typically live in:
 - o International Hall
 - o Reed Hall
 - o Massasoit Hall
- Students living in traditional halls are required to enroll in a full meal plan.
- Complete the Housing Preference Survey and Contract that will be emailed to you by the Office of Housing and Residence Life staff. Once your housing has been assigned, go to PrideNET, click on “Campus Life” and select “My Housing” to view your assignment.
- Each room includes:
 - o A bed (mattresses are twin extra long; 36 x 80 x 6 inches)
 - o A desk and chair
 - o A dresser and closet
 - o WiFi access
- In upper-class buildings that have suites or apartments, there is furniture in the common room but no cooking items, dishes, or utensils.

GRADUATE HOUSING AND MEAL PLANS

- **Housing and Dining Information**
- Graduate students can choose to live on campus or find their own housing off campus.
- On-campus graduate students can choose to live in a house or in apartment-style options.
- Graduate students are not required to purchase a meal plan, but may choose from any of the meal plan options. You may change your meal plan during the first two weeks of each semester through PrideNET.
- Complete the Housing Preference Survey and Contract that will be emailed to you by the Office of Housing and Residence Life staff and pay your housing deposit. Once your housing has been assigned, go to PrideNET, click on “Campus Life” and select “My Housing” to view your assignment.
- Things to consider about off-campus housing:
 - o Do you need to be near campus?
Do you have reliable transportation?
What is your budget?
Are you open to having roommates?
 - o You will likely need to sign a lease.
A lease is a contract. The amount of time that you sign for is the amount of time you are legally required to pay. Oftentimes, a 12-month lease is required.
 - o Depending on your personal finances, you may need a cosigner for a lease. A cosigner is someone who is responsible for paying your rent if you cannot. You may need a cosigner from the United States.

COMMON RESIDENCE LIFE TERMS AND DEFINITIONS

RESIDENCE HALLS

These are various buildings throughout campus where students live. They are locations where students get to know one another, develop community, and participate in programs and events.

RESIDENT ASSISTANT (RA)

An RA is a current, upper-class student who lives in your building. They work with other students and professional staff members to facilitate and develop a community environment that will contribute to the academic, social, cultural, and spiritual growth of students living in that residence hall.

COMMUNITY DIRECTOR

This is a professional staff member who oversees one or more residence halls and student staff, ensuring the development of an inclusive and engaging community environment and promoting the health and safety of all residents.

COMMON ROOM

This is a space located in each residence hall where students can meet, study, and talk. Many programs and activities are held there to connect residents and help you make friends.

DINING HALL

Cheney Hall is the main dining hall on campus for all. Meals can be purchased individually or using your meal plan. It is open for breakfast, lunch, and dinner during the week and brunch and dinner on the weekends when the college is in session.



ARRIVAL CHECKLIST

Prepare to Go through U.S. Customs and Immigration

- o When you arrive at the U.S. airport, be prepared to present the following to a customs officer when/if asked:
 - Your passport
 - Your I-20
 - Original acceptance letter from Springfield College
 - Bank statement/letter to prove you have enough money to study in the U.S.
- o You may be asked the following questions:
 - Why are you coming to the U.S.?
 - Where and what are you going to be studying?
 - Do you have an acceptance letter from Springfield College?
 - Where are you going to be living?
 - Do you have enough money to study in the U.S.?
 - What is the Springfield College address?

Arrange Transportation from the Airport

- o Springfield College is 90 minutes west of Logan Airport-Boston, Mass., and 30 minutes north of Bradley Airport-Hartford, Conn.
- o On the designated arrival days for international students, you can coordinate with the International Center staff to request shuttle service from Bradley Airport or Union Station-Springfield, Mass., to Springfield.
- o Uber: You can take an Uber to the Springfield College campus. Download the app on your smartphone to get started (you may need a U.S. SIM card if WiFi service is not available).
- o Taxi services will be available at the airport to take you wherever you need to go.

Check In with the International Center

- o As soon as you arrive in the U.S., you should check in with the International Center via email (internationalcenter@springfield.edu) or phone (413) 748-3215. Our hours are Monday-Friday 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. This is mandatory to keep your visa in status.
- o Submit a copy of your I-94 Arrival/Departure Record issued by U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP)

Attend Mandatory Orientation Programs

- o New undergraduate students are required to attend a customized International Student Welcome program as well as the New Student Orientation to welcome students to campus and help them acclimate academically, socially, and culturally.
- o Graduate students will be required to attend customized international student sessions as well as sessions related to the program of study.

Banking

- o Set up a U.S. bank account.
- o Set up your Springfield eRefund in PrideNET by going to your "My Financial" portal.
